

Focus on Wiltshire Council

I start the year with an appeal to you and our community. Covid is not a TV news item about other people in another town or country. In the last few weeks there have been many cases in our own locality, yet many have not taken up the vaccination programme. All the evidence clearly identifies that those affected most and hospitalised are those that have not been vaccinated. Some would say that this judgement not to get the jabs is selfish, depriving hospital beds to those most in need for other ailments such as cancer treatment or hip and knee replacements. It's not too late ... get your jabs and boosters now. If you don't know how to book online, or don't have access to a computer, or need help to get to a vaccination centre please call my mobile (07973 863 702) and I will try and direct you to the nearest centre. If you are stuck for transport the Link scheme can help you.

At County Hall the final budget planning continues, the Central Government cap of two percent continues and, as inflation and wage settlements are running at above this level, it seems hard to see how any services can be safe from some form of cuts. We await the final budget figures, also reminded that Wiltshire Council started the year identifying the need for forty million pounds of cuts to balance the books. On 14 February, the Budget will be finally debated and approved. I will report back next month.

Just before Christmas, I carried out one of my night visits around Cricklade trying to identify street lights that are not working. It was lovely to see so many houses decorated with Christmas lights and made the task a pleasure. Regrettably, although there were considerably fewer street lights out, those identified were some that have been out for months and some had only been fixed a few weeks ago but had failed again. Thanks to all of you for reporting failed streetlights either directly to Wiltshire Council on the "My Wilts" App or to me. Please remember to include the lamp standard number displayed on the lamp post so that the engineers can readily identify them.

Wiltshire Council have introduced a new single point of contact for Housing: "The Housing Advice Service" - phone no 0300 456 0106. The service provides tailored advice to those with housing issues or who are at risk of homelessness and deals with those facing eviction or possession action, affordability issues and paying rent or mortgage, or the suitability of existing accommodation, among other housing problems. People can also contact the team by email: homeless@wiltshire.gov.uk

The Homes4Wiltshire team remain on 0300 456 0104 for all enquiries relating to joining the housing register.

One of my responsibilities as a Wiltshire Councillor is that I sit on the Dorset & Wiltshire Fire Authority. At our recent meeting it was reported that the Fire Authority is becoming increasingly concerned about the recruitment of retained firefighters. The recent serious fire in the Indian restaurant in Cricklade High Street highlights the problem. There were several fire appliances in attendance from across the area but not from Cricklade as there were not enough firefighters to ride the appliance. Have you considered becoming a Firefighter based in Cricklade? Visit <u>dwfire.org.uk</u> for more details, and remember it is open to all; maybe there are some mums or those working from home looking for a new challenge or call in at the Cricklade Fire Station on a Monday evening, 7-9pm.

50 Shades of Green

The Adventures on a Wannabee Eco Warrior

What a whirlwind of recycling discovery January has been! And all just in time for me to take part in Waste Free February with Wiltshire Wildlife Trust to reduce my landfill 'waste-line' to one 30 litre bin bag for the month – if you want to take part you can choose your own receptacle, a jam jar or bin bag, whatever is a challenge for you. It seems a bit of a scary prospect but I was suckered into agreeing to it by my friend who knows that I'm at my weakest half way through a bottle of bubbles.

Looking into the recycling rules in preparation, it seems I was a bit of a 'wishcycler' – hoping that something I threw in the blue bin would magically find the right recycling process. As we've already discovered, medicine blister packs don't go in standard recycling (Fiona at Boots tells me the new bin has been very popular so well done Cricklade!) and the film from yoghurt pots can't go in there either. Film plastics, like ready meal film lids and crisp packets need separate recycling to yoghurt pots and plastic bottles. Large Tesco stores do have facilities for collecting and recycling this plastic waste so there's no need to put them in the household rubbish. Foil trays and clean kitchen foil can go in the blue bin but it needs to be collected in to a fist sized ball as it's sorted by a machine that can't see smaller pieces (obviously a middle aged machine that needs some 'readers'). And here's a paradox – you don't need to remove the plastic window from envelopes before recycling but you do need to remove the film window from cardboard food boxes (e.g. quiche) before they can go in! Wiltshire Council has a very good list on their website of what can and can't go in and the Cricklade CAN group will be holding some events later in 2022 to help clear up some 'wishcycler' myths!

Prosecco corks were a very pressing waste problem after Christmas – knee deep we were! I have found somewhere to recycle the corks though and a few of us decided it makes sense to send them off in bulk so we will be clubbing together to send them to RecorkedUK.org. You could join our club by emailing us on TrizaGreen@icloud.com or maybe you have friends like mine and could make your own Cork Club? We're also urgently looking into 101 uses for empty wine bottles!

Of course there is a basic sustainability issue here – just producing the volume of Prosecco demanded by the British market (or even just me) depletes the soils where the grapes are grown, requiring more use of fertilisers and pesticides, but I try to buy some organic ones to reduce my impact. Let's face it, going Green is a long haul mission so I don't have to fix everything immediately and I seem to learn an awful lot while sharing a bottle of fizz!

On Sunday 12 December 2021, a service of dedication was held in St Sampson's Church, Cricklade, for the completion of repairs to the South Transept and Nave roofs. Adina Grace thanked all those who have donated. The support of individuals, families and grant bodies was much appreciated. Barry Hammond, project manager,



announced that the total cost had come in just under budget. Just over 38% of the monies raised came from grant making bodies and just under 27% had come from individuals. The remainder was made up of fund-raising activities. Substantial grants have been received from Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust and Crapper & Sons Ltd. A plaque was presented by Community First, Wiltshire's Rural Community Council, which administers grants given by Crapper & Sons Ltd. Also in attendance were representatives from the Cricklade charities.

Barry recalled that one momentous event during the repairs had been the effects of a storm when the temporary roof was still in place over the Nave roof. He said, "It was a sight to see inches of water being swept way inadequately with church mops!"

The next stage of our project is to refurbish the inside of the building. We now need to make our dry building warm and well lit.

Hamster Care

Many children are given pet hamsters as Christmas presents and, without proper advice, some of these poor animals suffer in dreadful cage conditions for the rest of their lives.

First of all, you need to get your hamster a large cage - Blue Cross suggests a bare minimum of 80 x 50cm. And big enough for a 25cm deep layer of substrate.

Substrates include paper-based beddings, pet-safe compost, hamster-safe sand and wood shavings, but not all are safe for hamsters: 'fluffy' or cotton beddings can form strands which could wind round their legs cutting off the blood supply or entangle around their teeth. Some wood shavings release toxic chemicals.

Next, make sure your furry friend has an appropriately sized wheel. A hamster should be able to run on the wheel without bending its back. A Syrian hamster (bigger) should have a wheel which is at least 25cm (10 inches) in diameter. You might be able to get away with a 20cm wheel for a dwarf hamster.

Your pet hamster must have access to lots of enrichment, such as sand baths, wooden chews, large tunnels, bendy bridges, multi-chamber hideouts and other hamster-safe toys. They also need access to a water source: whether it's a bottle or a bowl it needs refilling daily. Hamsters are omnivores, which means they need a variety of fruits, vegetables, seeds and animal products to keep them healthy.

Finally, please do some more research regarding hamster care such as Victoria Raechel's informative videos on YouTube. Hamsters are a massive commitment, and you can expect to spend many hundreds of pounds on them in their lifetime.
