



Dog mess is the most unacceptable and offensive type of litter on our streets. Dog fouling is not only deeply unpleasant, but also dangerous. Whilst rare, contact with dog excrement can cause toxocariasis – a nasty infection that can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and even blindness or seizures.

- Pick up dog faeces.
- Keep dogs out of areas signed as exclusion areas e.g, children's play areas.
- Keep dogs on leads in designated areas such as the Town's allotments, the Cemetery, car parks and footpaths used to reach nurseries or schools.
- The Town Council maintains over 60 bins in Cricklade, all emptied regularly so
 there is no excuse not to use these.



Our rehearsal day and time remain the same – Thursday between 7.30-9.30pm.



Focus on Wiltshire Council

I am focusing on **road safety** this month. I get many calls about road safety issues so thought it appropriate to try and explain the procedures and ways you can report and get involved. Firstly there is the "MyWilts" App. Download to your smart phone, iPad or PC. There you can report a long list of issues: street lights (don't forget to record the lamp standard number), pavements, potholes, drains, traffic lights, road signs, graffiti and fly tipping. Your message goes direct to the relevant desk and normally gets a response within 24 hours.

All of the roads within Cricklade, Latton and Marston Meysey are the responsibility of Wiltshire Council (WC) except the A419 which is run by National Highways (formerly Highways England). Your first line of reporting is to your Town or Parish Council who will contact the Local Highways Engineer. For Cricklade the Town Council (CTC) has a Planning Transport and Conservation Committee (PCT, next meeting 11 April) where you are most welcome to write or attend to voice your concerns. In turn, concerns are referred to the Community Area Transport Group (CATG) for consideration and hopefully be resolved. (CTC has to contribute to any costs.) Members of the public can report Road Safety issues direct to CATG through the Area Board Community Area Manager (details online at Wiltshire Council). I am always here to assist.

Current issues include:

Speeding: This is a police matter and is regularly referred to them. The use of Community Speed Watch through volunteers helps to reduce the problem. Volunteers are always needed. In Cricklade remember it is 20 mph throughout the Town, Bath Road and Culverhay. Is it worth 3 points on your licence? The police are regularly checking all of these areas.

Road Markings: I have received many complaints regarding the diminished road markings at the Clock Tower in particular, and all the pedestrian crossings. These have all been reported to Highways and should have been repainted last summer. Various excuses have been offered but they will remain unpainted now until late spring, as this repainting work can only be carried out when frost free and dry weather are guaranteed.

Pedestrian Crossings: CTC and I have been demanding the crossings be better lit and more visual to motorists following numerous near misses. After the Highways engineers report, WC agreed to upgrade 2 of the 4 crossings but, after appealing the decision, WC have finally agreed to upgrade all 4. This will take some months to be completed.

Weight Limits and Speeding: The Fiddle and Forty: It would appear that many lorry drivers are disregarding both the speed limit and weight limit. This is particularly concerning as soon the footpath from Hitchings will join up with Church Walk. This I hope will then be a safe route to school, without Hitchings residents battling with being splashed from the puddles and HGVs on the Purton Road. I am preparing a case to present to CTC and CATG for width restrictions and additional road markings in the Fiddle and Forty. I would like to hear your views on this idea.

If you are having a problem with Wiltshire Council, the Housing Association, or just need some general advice, I can normally find the right contact or highlight your problem to *Page 18*The Chronicle

someone who can help. I have a direct telephone contact to all Officers in Wiltshire Council, and you will be surprised what can happen if you talk to the right person. I cannot promise to fix your problem personally, but I can assist you to resolve it.

I am also out and about in Cricklade, Latton and Marston Meysey during the week and even with the current restrictions always happy to meet with you if you have a specific problem to discuss. Crícklade 100 Years Ago Fritillaries

When the fritillaries were out in North Meadow, local people were free to wander wherever they pleased unhampered by officialdom, and to pick the 'snakes-heads', as they were known, indiscriminately. Doing so did not appear to harm the plant which grew prolifically every year. There are countless memories from the 1920s to bear



this out, from family picnic trips to gather the flowers for home, to the arrival of gypsies who filled tin baths with them to sell on locally. Reg Coole (b. 1919) remembered, "Fritillaries were always recognised as being peculiar to Cricklade; they're on our town badge, but in the 1920s they grew mainly in the north of the meadow. They were quite tall then; eighteen inches to two feet in length, whereas today they're only a third of that but more widely spread. We had nature walks from school in the twenties and some of the teachers got quite interested in the fritillary long before it received today's national acclaim. There were lots of other meadow flowers too and sometimes we brought some back for pressing."

50 Shades of Green

The Adventures of an Eco-Warrior Wannabee.

Insectageddon!!!!! I know I'm on a voyage of discovery but some things I just didn't need to know about. Insects? Armageddon? Pretty high on my list of things not to think about. In fact hearing it caused me to dribble red wine on S's tablecloth and that's just not like me.

Once I'd calmed down it wasn't as bad as I thought in one sense but much worse in another. We aren't all going to die at the pincers of giant earwigs but all the earwigs are going to die at our hands. According to Friends of the Earth some estimates suggest that flying insect numbers are reducing at 6% per year, with a number of possible causes – loss of habitat, industrial farming methods and cumulative pesticide use being the prime suspects.

I have witnessed it myself – having lived next to common land for 16 years, I have seen the decline in dragonflies, damselflies, butterflies and crickets that wander into my home. With their decline, it follows that the frogs, toads, newts, birds and small mammals that feed on them will also disappear.

Learning about this has made me feel slightly kinder towards earwigs and wasps, which also have their place in life's tapestry. It's time to set my garden up for the spring and I for one shall be planting insect friendly plants and steering clear of ALL pesticides. S has just offered me foxgloves, toadflax, borage and field geranium ... and a bottle of worm wee from her wormery as fertiliser. Aren't I the lucky one?

Don't get out much?

We've just passed 23 March which marked the 2nd anniversary of Covid lockdown restrictions in some form or other. As we come out of those restrictions, do you feel you haven't actually been anywhere for two years now?

Maybe you have!

Cricklade sits at approximately 51.6°N of the equator (latitude) and the earth has an approximate average diameter of 7,917 miles. That is of course approximate as, apart from the hills, valleys and other lumpy bits, the planet is a bit squashed like say a plastic beach ball squeezed gently on top and bottom. But if we ignore that, the latitude circle round the globe at 51.6°N is about 15,450 miles. (The maths is at the bottom if you are interested!)

So our mother planet turns on its own axis in 1 day. That is precise because that is what we call a day. As a result, Cricklade revolves around the earth's axis at a speed of 15,450 miles per day, so 644 miles an hour, or 84% of the speed of sound. And you thought you were standing still?

Over the 2 years of travel restrictions you have actually travelled 15,450 miles every day, 365 days per year for 2 years. That's 11.3 million miles. If you tried to do that by car at 70mph that would take you 161,000 hours non-stop or a bit over 18 years. Earth managed it in just those 2 years.

With an average car fuel economy of say 50mpg (11 miles per litre) you would have needed 1 million litres of fuel which, at today's locally cheapest price of 142.7p per litre, would have cost you £1.5 million [28 February 2022].

That's not quite the end of the story. The earth revolves around the sun in 1 year; on average 365.25 days - that extra quarter is why there's a leap year every fourth year. We are on average 91.46 million miles from the sun. If you remember maths from school, our orbital distance round the sun is 2π times R (the distance from the sun) which comes to 575 million miles. 575m miles per year is 66,000 miles an hour. 86 times the speed of sound ...

In 2 years we've travelled twice that distance, so 1.15 billion miles!

Maths: the diameter of a circle is 2π times the radius and π (pi) is about 3.142. If Cricklade is at 51.6°N the corresponding sector angle $\alpha = 90 - 51.6 = 38.4^\circ$. The sine of an angle in a triangle is defined as the length of the opposite side O divided by the hypotenuse H. We approximate H to the earth's radius (r) as half the diameter, so 7917/2 = 3960 miles. O is the latitude sector radius, which is z in the diagram. From triangle: $\sin \alpha = z/r$, so $z = r.\sin \alpha = 3960 \times 0.6211 = 2459$ miles. The latitude circumference at Cricklade $= 2\pi.z = 15.450$ miles.



The Final Word ...

There are few things that look more dead than woodland in winter. Twigs, sticks, branches, all bare, all the glory gone from them in the autumn in that blaze of glory as the leaves change colour and fall to the ground. And in the grey days of January and February, we batten down the hatches (as it were) and slug it out with the winter wind and chill – with the added greyness this year of fears about our heating bills and the rising prices.

The Easter cry of joy: Hallelujah, Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. Hallelujah!
