### The Manorial Court of The Hundred and Borough of Cricklade

### Public Court Leet on Friday 28 October at 7pm Cricklade Town Hall

There are records of The Manorial Court holding meetings going back for several hundred years. These are known as a Court Leet. These Courts existed throughout the country, but many have been lost as their duties to manage and enforce justice have been replaced by legislation. Historically this Court's main function is to manage the grazing rights on North Meadow on behalf of residents. This responsibility was guaranteed by Act of Parliament as recently as the 1960s.

The last Public Court was scheduled for 2020 but, like many other organisations, could not go ahead due to Covid. Since then, the Court has managed to purchase, with the help of a Lottery Grant, the last privately owned 'compartment' on the meadow. Historically the meadow was divided into several compartments and owned by various farmers and residents, but grazing rights continued to be held for a period each year. All of these have over the course of many years been purchased by Natural England to help protect the special status of the meadow. This is an exciting development for the Court and this meeting is an opportunity to hear more about our plans and to ask questions. Whilst reports from Officers are often entertaining, the responsibility for the maintenance and protection of North Meadow is perhaps more important than ever with the impact of climate change and pressure from development.

**I hereby give notice** to all Freemen, Burgage holders and Residents of the Town that Officers and Jurymen of the Court have been summoned by the Lord of the Manor to attend on the above date to hear reports, including an update on North Meadow, make such decisions that are necessary and to conduct any other relevant Court business.

#### Focus on Wiltshire Council

With Wiltshire Council in summer recess during August and writing this on 1 September, there is very little to report.

Planning still tops the subjects for Wiltshire Councillors as developers exploit the lack of housing land supply. Here in Cricklade yet another development for 55 homes has been proposed. The developer promises smaller homes and even some bungalows. Should the development go ahead, I am sure this would be most welcome to those wishing to downsize. In the meantime the planning applications on Common Hill and Stones Lane continue through the planning process which will see outcomes in the coming months.

The new street scene contract has been approved and the good news is that idVerde have retained the contract for 5 years which will give some stability in the contract transition.

The bad news is that the contract is expected to make considerable financial savings. With services already cut back one has to ask what else will be cut.

Further cuts have been announced by GreenSquareAccord with the stopping of garden services to vulnerable clients who in the past have had their gardens maintained. I am constantly calling GreenSquare Estates team about poor maintenance. The walls and public gardens on Culverhay are a disgrace. The response is always the contractor didn't do it. The anomaly that grass verges in Thames Lane are also GreenSquare Estates has yet to be resolved. For the last six years I have had to prompt their estates team every year of their responsibility.

I remain concerned that many of our elderly residents are not getting the financial assistance they are entitled to. If you are in contact with any vulnerable residents, please ensure they are aware of the grants they are entitled to from Wiltshire Council and Central Government

In particular, many of these grants are initiated online and if they are without online access they are being denied essential funds. Our Community needs to take a big step to help our neighbours. It is already autumn and it will be getting colder. No one in Cricklade, Marston Meysey or Latton should be cold or have to make a choice between food or warmth. Look out for your neighbours – they may be too proud to tell you. Be a little nosy, a flask of soup, an extra duvet could be a life saver. Many will not ask for help until it's a crisis. If you feel you cannot be directly involved then perhaps you could support the "food bank" – see article on page 27 in The Chronicle.

If you are having a problem with Wiltshire Council, the Housing Association, or just need some general advice, I can normally find the right contact or highlight your problem to someone who can help. I have a direct telephone contact to all Officers in Wiltshire Council, and you will be surprised what can happen if you talk to the right person. I cannot promise to fix your problem personally, but I can assist you to resolve it.

#### **Building works update**

The last few months have been extremely busy and at the time of writing, the following has been achieved:

- Our excellent team of volunteers (around 30) have cleared the site following the installation of the steels and the removal of the chimney.
- This involved cleaning and saving 3,500 bricks, barrowing hardcore and rubble to the rear of the garden and creating a base for the car park area – a great effort, by a great team!
- The next stage will be the groundworks for the drains and extension footings. Once completed, we hope to begin internal works on the residential flats.

#### 50 Shades of Green

#### The adventures of an Eco Warrior Wannabee

"Are we nearly there yet?" How many times have you heard that this summer? I've had a great summer with some lovely trips, and I hope you have too. I've discovered that although I can drink pretty much any wine served to me, I'm a lot more choosy about the beers. I've also discovered an exciting array of clear spirits across Europe, many of them called something along the lines of Raki or Arrak, Slivovic or Tsiprou, and the locals get very animated and welcoming when you ask to try it. Limoncello, however, is in a different class and I don't often get to 'help' anyone to finish that off. Dang it!

Some people, however, have spent the summer asking, "Is it nearly here yet?" – about creeping wildfires, or dried up riverbeds, not in sun drenched, Mediterranean countries but here in the no-longer-soggy UK. In some countries climate threats are now commonplace – I spent a week on a beach in Greece watching reconnaissance helicopters scour the hills for signs of a fire, water planes dispatched to smouldering islands. And I saw a fire start on the hills above Athens as I stood on the Acropolis. This week Pakistan has been virtually swept away by flash monsoon floods following record breaking summer temperatures of 50°+. More parts of the earth are becoming unliveable and that means more refugees and migration, less land to grow crops and fewer supplies in the markets.

So are we nearly there yet? Are we beginning to really comprehend that things are changing rapidly, and they will affect us all? Am I a hypocrite for wanting climate action but flying on aeroplanes? Possibly? But I am not a frequent flyer, I believe we incorrectly focus on small, individual actions when at this stage in the game we need large scale action. Extinction Rebellion, Just Stop Oil and Insulate Britain are pilloried for their disruptive protests, but they are trying to focus attention on the fundamental, large-scale changes that need to be made in order to avoid a catastrophic rise above 2°. We have already missed the initial target of 1.5° and will likely see most of that 2° rise – the resulting increased number of climate emergencies are costing billions. The argument that we can't afford to make the necessary changes is looking weak.

I have thought more this year about my flights. A few years ago, we caught the sleeper train overnight to Verona and Venice, an adventure in itself, and we only flew one way. I still treasure the memory of pulling out of Paris Gare De Lyon as we settled down with a few beers and our music on a speaker in our family cabin. We didn't really sleep, the entire journey felt like a trip on the Polar Express (perhaps more beer was needed?) but that didn't stop us from staying up until 1am the next night in order to subject the children to 5 hours of opera on the marble steps of an amphitheatre. They'll thank us one day.

I've also seen a couple of adult friends this year using the Interrail ticket to explore Europe - perhaps I need to make more use of Europe's fantastic railways so that I can continue giving my kids a sense of their place in this world, before it becomes inaccessible to them. What I will also do is support and advocate for groups who are putting their own liberty on the line to challenge the status quo and move our whole society forward into true action and leadership.


