

Purton & Green Gable Surgery PPG

Serving patients in Purton, Cricklade & surrounding communities



PPG Fundraising

Three years ago we raised funds for and purchased a Doppler Machine. Patients who suffer from leg ulcers have a risk of developing deep vein thrombosis (DVT) and therefore need regular checks. The procedure that is undertaken is called a Doppler assessment where the nurse checks the blood flow through legs and ankles. Although the Doppler machine allows the measurement to be done in minutes, the pre-resting time and assessment can extend it to 50 minutes.

Another machine has been ordered for Green Gable Surgery in Cricklade, costing £3,000. This will benefit patients and free up valuable appointment time for other patients.


A treatment couch for the consulting room at Cricklade Green Gable Surgery has also been ordered. We are very grateful for the generosity of Purton & District Age Concern for offering to buy a high-backed chair with arms for the Green Gable waiting room.

50 Shades of Green

The Adventures of an Eco-Warrior Wannabee

Oh the end of summer seems so depressing doesn't it? It's all back to school, back to work, and back on the diet, so no booze in the week. Actually – there's a couple of snifters left in a bottle in the fridge and what with a cost of living crisis it seems criminal to let it go off. Anyway, when things are getting me down I always cheer myself up by singing Monty Python's The Galaxy Song. "Whenever life gets you down Mrs Brown, and Things seem hard or tough, and people are stupid, obnoxious, or daft, and you feel like you've just had enough...

Just remember that you're standing on a planet that's evolving..."

One thing Cricklade has had enough of is the medicine blister pack and they're not going away anytime soon. Our wonderful pharmacy team at Boots were all on board to collect medicine blister packs and work with the Boots Area Manager to find a route for recycling them. After all, Superdrug are doing it. However, our hardworking shop manager did her best but was met with a total lack of interest from Boots' management and has unfortunately had to stop collecting the blister packs in the box provided by Cricklade CAN. The shop staff see how many hundreds of these packs they dispense and empty every day and are dismayed by the amount of waste. We can also see, by how many of you brought bags of blister packs in, that this is a concern for Cricklade residents too. I'm not sure that the Boots Environmental Policy, which includes the line 'Ensure responsible management of waste that is unavoidable' is really being honoured currently.

There may be a way forward though. In some industries, companies that profit from a product have long been required to make sure there is a process and funds allocated for dealing with that product at the end of its life. I first came across this while working in the tyre industry 20 years ago but since then it has been rolled out into the electronics industry – it's called Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR). From April 2023 the UK Government will require all large companies to manage an EPR process for their own brand products. Boots already do this for their cosmetic items, so they are on the ball. But they also sell millions of packs of medicine, produced by other companies, which Boots have no legal responsibility for, and which Boots will not currently take back. As homework I'd like as many of you as possible to write to Lucy Reynolds, Director of Communications and Corporate and Social Responsibility at Boots (just put Nottingham and it will find her!) and ask what plans Boots has to manage a waste system for medicine packaging when the pharmaceutical companies are required to provide an EPR system from next year. Hopefully this new regulation will also encourage companies to review their packaging and create something less bulky and easier to recycle, as they will be charged a waste management fee for any packaging that is likely to end up in household waste, unless they have clear evidence that the packaging is being managed elsewhere. Well, that's the theory but...

Focus on Wiltshire Council

It has been a busy few weeks as Council gets back to work following the summer break. It will be of no surprise that planning tops the subjects yet again this month.

"The Local Plan" is the basis against which planning applications are determined and neighbourhood plans developed. It is a legally required document containing planning policies and site allocations to deliver Wiltshire Council's strategic priorities. The original plan was adopted in 2015 and the review now will take us to 2036. This document is the one that currently allows developers to exploit the 5-year housing supply shortage.

In September, Wiltshire Council announced further delays in the review process which will give even more uncertainty to the communities and allow further planning applications from developers to be approved. The Planning Inspector has overruled several more planning applications this month in favour of the developers in Malmesbury through this loophole and no doubt we can expect a similar approach in Cricklade by the developers and receive little sympathy from the Inspector.

A better planning result on another planning matter; the Bio Digester proposed for Water Eaton has been under scrutiny by planners. The site is actually within Swindon, but all roads leading to it are in Wiltshire. It would appear that the applicant's wish to carry out major road widening to service the Bio Plant has not been submitted to WC and a complete review of the application is now underway jointly with Swindon Borough Council.

I am Vice Chairman of the Wiltshire Council Environmental Select Committee (ESC). The committee topics at our meeting included a review of waste management. You will have noticed your bins sometimes get collected a day late. This is because WC has reduced staff and vehicles and made collection rounds larger. The outcome is that their collection teams can't complete the task and the trucks are full quicker. ESC has sent this back to Officers to resolve. The proposed savings in another service, "Street Scene" were discussed at length with planned less grass cutting and more 'wilding' along with reactive instead of proactive services - meaning more complaints, I fear.

Locally, Gigaclear are on the move again digging up all over Cricklade for broadband fibre cable installation. Generally they are doing a tidy job without much inconvenience apart from some areas of poor ground restoration which I am communicating with them to rectify.

There is a survey online asking about your views on Wiltshire Council's website and My Wiltshire App. If you have used either please complete the survey. There is a new telephone number for contacting Wiltshire Council (0300 456 0100) and I would like to hear from anyone that has used it for some feedback on the service given.

If you are having a problem with Wiltshire Council, the Housing Association, or just need some general advice, I can normally find the right contact or highlight your problem to someone who can help. I have a direct telephone contact to all Officers in Wiltshire Council, and you will be surprised what can happen if you talk to the right person. I cannot promise to fix your problem personally, but I can assist you to resolve it.

Cricklade 100 Years Ago Christmas shopping.

Most Cricklade people, without personal transport, only shopped locally at Christmas. Many families paid into Christmas Clubs operated by shops throughout the year at so much a week. By Christmas they'd use these savings to buy goods at that particular shop.



The New family at No. 31 High Street, who

generally sold hardware and green grocery, ran such a scheme. They'd keep their window blind down enticingly while they dressed it for Christmas, before raising it to everyone's delight to reveal a large selection of Christmas goods. For little girls there were large dolls, dolls' pushchairs, prams and houses, plus blackboards and easels, desks with seats, pen and pencil sets, 'Fairy cycles', baby walkers, children's sewing machines, toy pianos, tea sets and musical boxes. For the boys there were Triang pedal cars, scooters and tricycles, air guns, roller skates, Hornby trains, Meccano sets, table tennis equipment and footballs. Nurse and cowboy outfits, and paper chains for house decoration were popular with both. For adults there was a large selection of pottery, china, glass vases, water sets, cutlery, chromium teapots, watches and clocks for all ages, even perfume and manicure sets.

W.J. New's shop was also a green grocery, and in the final two weeks before Christmas, hundredweight sacks of various nuts would arrive, plus barrels of Canadian red apples. Christmas trees, holly wreaths and mistletoe were much in demand followed by cases of oranges, bananas and grapes and boxes of dates and figs. The last few days were really hectic with as many as three hundredweight of sprouts being brought down from Evesham!





Cricklade & Latton Records at the History Centre

At the Wiltshire and Swindon History Centre we safeguard records from parishes all across the county. These originated at parish churches and were transferred to us in Chippenham once they had served their original purpose. Here they become part of the historic written evidence of our county and can be made available to researchers.

The parish records of St Mary's, St Sampson's and St John the Baptist's tell us a great deal about issues, activities, and decision-making within the area. They note the successive ministers and churchwardens, church council minutes; records of the Overseers of the Poor, parish schools, registers of baptisms, marriages and burials - the oldest date from 1578. All pre-1916 registers have been digitised and their contents can be searched via Ancestry.com. Many of the original volumes are too fragile for public access and we have withdrawn them to safe-keeping.

We also hold the large archive of the Diocese of Salisbury with ordination papers going back to the 17th century and glebe terriers for all three parishes, though St Sampson's can boast the eldest, dating from 1588. Cricklade was part of the Diocese of Salisbury until 1837 after which its records will be at Bristol Archives.

We also hold records of the Wayland Estate, Cricklade United Charities, Latton Parish Council, the Swindon & Cricklade Young Farmers' Club and Cricklade Historical Society, maps and more. We are the repository for county and local councils, whose files contain a wealth of information on local people, buildings, and events.

To access our holdings simply type Wiltshire and Swindon History Centre Catalogue into your search engine (e.g. Google). This will give you a link to our searchable online catalogue. If you would then like to visit us, we recommend an appointment, as our searchroom is often fully booked. We are open Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. We also provide free use of Ancestry.com, as well as an extensive Local Studies library and the Wiltshire Building Record containing over 18,000 records of individual Wiltshire buildings.
