

Next PPG purchases

A Fractional Exhaled Nitric Oxide (FeNO) device. This is a novel medical technology used to aid in the diagnosis of asthma. FeNO devices measure nitric oxide in the breath of patients. Nitric oxide is a biomarker for asthma which provides an indication of the level of inflammation in the lungs. Testing produces an FeNO score which gives a value to the level of inflammation which aids clinicians in the diagnosis of asthma. Although the FeNO device is primarily a diagnostic tool, it has an additional use in the ongoing monitoring of chronic asthma.

A second Dermatoscope. This is a piece of equipment used for examining the appearance of the skin, ordinary skin as well as moles, to diagnose skin problems. Although dermoscopy can be helpful in all forms of skin diagnosis, it is particularly helpful for the diagnosis of skin cancer. This will ensure patients are referred timely and appropriately to hospital, if required. Several staff are now using the one purchased by the PPG four years ago and a second one would help enormously.

50 Shades of Green

The Adventures of an Eco-Warrior Wannabee.

I recently went to a talk on matriarchal medicine – I thought it might involve lots of witchy brews and holistic healing but it turns out that the way matriarchal physicians make a diagnosis is by getting a bunch of women together who get stoned and dance all night until they 'see' the problem. Of course this is where I spot the flaw in their method; I often don't remember the boogie with the girls on the following morning. Still, I feel there is some ancient, spiritual wisdom to be found so I'm willing to keep trying.

I had thought the structure of matriarchal societies was just a reversal of our current patriarchy. It's far more interesting than that: the home is centred around the women of a family – a mother, her sisters, granny and aunties will live together in one house. Their brothers will also live in this house permanently and are the male role models to any children of the women. Everyone will act as a parent to all the children.

'So where do the kids come from?' I hear you wondering. Well, romantic liaisons are simply that – a dalliance with no long term attachments and involve men visiting overnight with their chosen 'squeeze'. In the morning they return to their sisters to parent their nieces and nephews in the clan house. So if a romantic relationship breaks down, the children experience no fallout – their clan carries on the same.

The old tribal systems that used this form of society have pretty much died out now.

But a modern version has emerged in Colombia. Nashira is an eco-village created by women fleeing domestic violence or the civil war. The women help build their own homes using waste materials and houses remain the property of the women and cannot be taken away, even if they fall into debt. The village grows its own food and they trade within the village with their own currency so that wealth remains within the village. Of course men are welcome in the village but the homes and resources remain in the hands of women, providing stability, a route out of poverty and room to explore sustainable methods of living. As the saying goes 'where women do well, communities do well' and seven more eco-villages are underway in Colombia.

Some suggest that our western civilisation has reached its limits its current form. While today we face multiple challenges within our climate, ecosystem, society and economy, there may be other ways to organise ourselves. Over the millennia humans have created numerous kinds of societies, each of them designed around the current knowledge and environment.

I just heard an exciting new word: Solarpunk - a movement that envisions and works toward a sustainable future connected in with nature and community. "Solar" represents renewable energy sources and optimism for a future embracing technology and rejecting doom. "Punk" senses an enthusiasm to break the mould to create that future.

Let's keep our minds open to new ways of living – as you'll guess, I'm always up for a bit of 'matriarchal medicine' and I'm rather partial to a bit of Punk too.

Wishing you all a very Happy Christmas and a Happy New Year, but do us all a favour and don't buy any new lights eh? Bah Humbug!

Focus on Wiltshire Council

Fly tipping is on the increase in our area, and I thought it appropriate to remind you of the rules you should be aware of when disposing of your unwanted goods and waste.

Firstly, you can take almost any item to the Recycling Centre at Purton at no charge; (winter hours, open 10-4, closed Tuesday and Wednesday.) You do need to take some proof of address. If you use one of the many people offering waste removal via advertising on social media, doorstep flyers etc, remember that **your waste** is **your waste** until properly disposed of. Fly-tipping is an offence under Section 33 of the Environmental Protection Act (1990). If you are a householder, you are required to take reasonable steps to check that the people removing waste from your premises are authorised to do so.

Under the domestic waste 'Duty of Care', householders are responsible for ensuring that their rubbish is only passed on to authorised waste carriers. Some people pose as legitimate waste carriers, and then fly tip rubbish that they have been paid to dispose of properly. If any fly tipped waste is traced back to you, you could be prosecuted or fined for breaking the law. A fine of up to £400.

Recently, a lorry load of green waste and hedge cuttings was dumped in Cricklade on the old Latton Road completely blocking the road and, on the Spine Road, an entire bathroom suite was dumped. Someone had paid for the removal - if you employ a Tradesman or Waste Collector, ask to see their Waste Carriers Licence and preferably take a photo of it, to prove you have seen it. Be warned, Wiltshire Council is stepping up investigations and the number of Officers to trace rogue fly tippers.

Some really good news: earlier this year, I invited the head of Economic Development at Wiltshire Council to visit Cricklade. At the time she was most impressed by our High Street and the range of retail outlets and the facilities we offer. Some of you may have taken part in a survey in the summer asking about Cricklade. Over 400 of you submitted survey forms which were compiled by the High Street Strategy Group and the Town Council. Wiltshire Council complemented the work of the two organisations. This has led to Cricklade taking part in a new Wiltshire Council initiative "Wiltshire Towns Programme". Cricklade has been invited to bid for finance for projects to further enhance the Town under this scheme. At the end of October, a very successful meeting was held to move the project forward. This has resulted in a financial package for Cricklade, the full details are still to be worked out. For one of the smallest towns in Wiltshire this is a great achievement.

The Chronicle takes a break in January, so I will hopefully start the new year in February with further good news to report on the outcome of the grant awarded.

That just leaves me to wish you all a Happy Christmas and prosperous New Year and a request to look out for your neighbours to ensure they stay safe and warm.

If you are having a problem with Wiltshire Council, the Housing Association, or just need some general advice, I can normally find the right contact or highlight your problem to someone who can help. I have a direct telephone contact to all Officers in Wiltshire Council, and you will be surprised what can happen if you talk to the right person.



Cricklade 100 Years Ago

Carol Singing memories

In the 1920s three little boys lived with their parents at the west-end kennel cottage in Bath Road. Bert, the middle brother, described their carol singing just before Christmas: "We visited most of the roads in and around Cricklade. Half a dozen of us would walk from house to house singing, and carrying one or two hurricane lamps to light our way. We shared our



earnings between us, but for me and my two brothers it was more rewarding to go on our own to Flores Ville where Colonel Fuller lived. We'd stand outside and sing, and then tap on the door. Mrs Smithson his housekeeper would answer and say, 'And who are you?', and we'd say, 'The Turner boys.' 'You wait while I tell him.' Then she'd say, 'The Colonel wants you to sing 'The First Noel' to him, and then he'll give you five shillings.' So we'd go in and sing, and he'd say, 'That was very nice. Now Mrs Smithson will give you some drinking chocolate and mince pies.' We had good voices, and looked forward to that every year!"

And here is one from a church member: "Just before midnight on Christmas Eve a group from the church would go carol singing all around the streets and the lanes stopping mostly around the lampposts so that they could see to sing. The Town Crier would come with them with his bell, and after midnight struck he'd ring it, and cry, 'Awake! Awake! Salute this happy morn,' and then they'd move on a little bit further." 



WHY? Currently, Wayland Estates Charity gives approximately £10,000 per annum to community groups. The Charity has a limited amount of capital, providing a small amount of income, with little opportunity for growth. Examples of projects that have been supported are machinery for the Cricket Club, equipment for the Town Band, a gate at the Jenner Hall, the Clock at St Mary's, mirrors in the Dance Studio at the Leisure Centre. Our grants, given for capital projects not for running costs, enable groups to provide a community facility that may otherwise be lost in the future without valuable support.

It is hoped that you may like to donate now or leave a legacy in your will for the benefit of Cricklade and the future of Cricklade. Wayland Estates Charity is the perfect way to do this by adding to the Charity's capital and ensuring a healthy future income with which to help groups supporting everyone in Cricklade.
