Focus on Wiltshire Council

I try to be non-political in my monthly article, just reviewing the happenings at County Hall. However, Local Government is being brought to its knees with spiralling costs of materials, the lack of staff and political indecision. I am getting an increasing number of complaints regarding planning applications. The time taken to get decisions is increasing at every turn.

The reasons given are the huge number of applications being submitted by developers trying to bypass the five-year housing supply plan before the local plan is published. The Plan will probably limit their opportunity to build outside the framework boundary of existing settlements such as Cricklade.

The second cause of delays is that planning officers are leaving to go to the private sector. The spiral of increased workload on the remaining officers is now at unacceptable levels. Officers are handling 60 - 70 cases each, where the norm should be in the teens. The number of appeals by developers is also increasing as the refusal rate increases against developers' plans to build on green field sites. The outcome of this failure in the system is that you can expect to wait months for planning applications to be examined and decisions made.

The Administration has reduced the working hours of the traffic enforcement team. The outcome is that we are likely to see fewer enforcement visits and more indiscriminate illegal parking often putting pedestrians at risk. I have requested that the police use their powers and consider some of these parking incidents as motoring offences where there is clear evidence of danger to the highway or public.

As I write this, the budget papers have been published and can be viewed online at Wiltshire Council. Central government has approved up to 5% increase in Council Tax of which 1.9% will be for Adult Social Care. This will, it is hoped, reduce the bed blocking as the Health Authorities attempt to find suitable places for those fit to leave hospital but who need support during recovery or assisted living.

Until 31 March, an Assisted Travel Scheme is in place to encourage the use of public transport. All bus fares across the County will be capped at £2 for all users an opportunity to get out and about and visit people and places across the county.

If you are having a problem with Wiltshire Council, the Housing Association, or just need some general advice, I can normally find the right contact or highlight your problem to someone who can help. I have a direct telephone contact to all Officers in Wiltshire Council, and you will be surprised what can happen if you talk to the right person. I cannot promise to fix your problem personally, but I can assist you to resolve it.

EV Charging points in Cricklade

CTC obtained a grant from the Department for Transport to install EV Charging Points in two areas of Cricklade. One is at the Fairview Fields/Stockham Close Car Park (next to the Rugby Field) and the other is at Cricklade Leisure Centre. There are four double charging points at each location.

CTC worked with BP Pulse who provided the 25% balance of the funding, meaning that there has been no cost to Cricklade residents in delivering the project.

Cricklade Open Door – From the Trustees

Many of you will be aware of Cricklade Open Door through the regular articles that appear in *The Chronicle*. You may be a member or have a relation or friend who benefits from the company, activities and outings offered by Open Door. We open three days a week on a drop-in basis although our nourishing hot lunches must be pre-booked.



We have two wonderful, employed co-ordinators and a marvellous team of volunteers who work tirelessly providing cups of tea and coffee, chatting to members, organising events and much, much more; the list is endless. Another group of invaluable volunteers are the drivers and escorts of our minibus who transport members to and from Open Door as well as those who ensure that the bus is cleaned, serviced, insured and safe to be used.

Up until 2021 we received an annual grant of just under £9,000 from Wiltshire Council and then in 2022 we were told it would be cut by 50% and withdrawn altogether in 2023. This follows budget cuts within Adult Social Care and has affected some 30 (mostly community run) organisations providing adult social opportunities across the county.

Now is not the time to consider the rights and wrongs of this decision, save to say that some groups have now folded. Open Door is very fortunate in that our future is secure for the time being, due to a very generous legacy that enabled Open Door to buy a new minibus; this means that our funds previously ring fenced for a new bus are still intact. However we cannot just dip into this money as many donations were given to us specifically for the minibus and, with rising wages, energy costs etc, it wouldn't last long!

We are most grateful to Cricklade Town Council who have awarded us a grant of £5,000 for this coming financial year. Many residents and businesses of Cricklade, as well as our own members, already generously support Open Door with fundraising events, monthly standing orders and donations. However we would be grateful for more financial support. Restoring the Cotswold Canals



... important work which started over 50 years ago is reaching our area!

The Cotswold Canals Trust was formed in 1972 to restore the 36 miles of the Stroudwater Navigation and the Thames & Severn Canal which together ran from Saul (on the Severn near Gloucester) to Inglesham.

Two substantial National Lottery grants have unlocked funding of over £50 million to enable restoration of 10 miles through Stroud to Saul. The large local population supports restoration as a means of regenerating what had become a dilapidated ribbon through their town and which has now attracted a large volunteer base. Restoration is now well advanced on the western sections.

We now want tackle the Eastern Section and develop plans and assemble resources to similarly restore the 10 mile eastern section from South Cerney, through Latton and Eisey to the Thames at Inglesham.

Not all is lost: Most of the historic route is still visible requiring dredging and repair, but a ¾ mile section in Latton was destroyed when the A419 bypass was built and will need to be re-dug. Elsewhere all of the original highway bridges have been lost and apart from one at South Cerney rebuilt in 2003, will need replacing – all seven of them.

Successful restoration of the canal is dependent upon three critical areas all coming together in partnership.

To help make restoration happen, we are getting support of Local Authorities, National Agencies, Trusts and local businesses.

To allow restoration to happen, we are asking land-owners to give access permission and help with land acquisition or leases.

To undertake the restoration, we need volunteers – lots of them. There are many volunteering opportunities where you can help by bringing existing skills and expertise, or you can help whilst learning new skills from our many experts.

Have a look at our website to find out more about what we have achieved, and see our A to Z of volunteering opportunities where you can be part of the largest canal restoration society in the UK, working together to leave a lasting legacy of a natural wildlife and leisure corridor across the south Cotswolds and Water Park..

In addition to the more obvious hands-on physical canal restoration work, we urgently need volunteers to help with a range of supporting activities in our new workshops near Driffield involving mechanical and wood-working tasks. We are also setting up a new visitor centre and second hand bookshop near South Cerney and require volunteers to run it. 50 Shades of Green

The Adventures of an Eco-Warrior Wannabee

My great grandfather, Tom Hudson, was known to make his own elixir of life and I'm willing to bet that the recipe was passed down from his mother, Ann



Hudson. Ann appears to have been a formidable woman who lived her entire 'married' life 'over the broom' (a euphemism for common law marriage or unmarried) and retained her maiden name of Hudson – apparently poor James Owen was forbidden by his family to marry Ann as she wasn't the 'right sort', but Ann and James still managed to raise 11 children together, of which Tom was the eldest.

The elixir recipe is unfortunately lost but I wanted to revive the family tradition and of course it would have to be made with cheap or local ingredients (and avoid elderflower as I'm the only person in the world who dislikes it). After choosing two very common and safe herbs, nettle seeds and cleavers, I then investigated methods of extracting their herbal powers and after a little research it was very apparent that steeping the herbs in strong alcohol to create a tincture was obviously the method for me, so I started frequenting the reduced price alcohol section of Lidl (again). The alcohol needs to be more than 40% proof so I used slivovic, schnapps and a particularly strong, double distilled gin (all tested for quality obviously) and steeped my herbs in them for three months. After squeezing it out through muslin cloths (left over from when the kids were small) I decanted the tincture into second hand miniature gin bottles and presented it to friends in hand made gift boxes made from pizza cartons (thanks Anna).

One of the reasons for brewing this elixir was to 'create' a gift for my friends that did not involve new items – the Secret Life of Stuff, a great book by Julie Hill, explains the convoluted life-cycle of every bit of 'stuff' that we buy – from the mining of the materials, to the final shipping to store, and once you've read it you begin to see the vast and devastating consequences of our consumer, growth society.

As part of our efforts to reduce purchases of Stuff, Cricklade CAN will be working in 2023 to build a 'Library of Things' to enable Cricklade residents to hire infrequently used items, such as wallpaper steamers or gazebos, instead of purchasing one just for it to sit in your garage for 98% of the time. Every Kärcher left in Argos is one less drain on the planet!

I'm also creating an eco-library of books, including the Secret Life of Stuff - if you'd like a list of titles or to find out more about the Library of Things, email *TrizaGreen@icloud.com*.

Next time you see me in the pub, 'holding a G&T', just remember it's actually a herbal tincture of juniper with a quinine infusion and an additional source of vitamin C.





The Final Word ...

O God our Creator, your kindness has brought us the gift of a new morning. Help us to leave yesterday and not to covet tomorrow but to accept the uniqueness of today. Take from us what we need to carry no longer, so that we may be free again to choose to serve you and be served by each other. Amen

We are now part way into the season of Lent. Beginning 40 days before Easter, Lent has traditionally been a time of looking inward, a time of self-evaluation and self-examination. At times Christians have fasted during portions of Lent, others mark the days by "giving up" something that they particularly enjoy. For some it's sweets, for others alcohol, habits which often are picked up again when Easter arrives.

For many of us, we are so taken up with the busyness of life; that slowing down and looking inward requires a determined act of will. For Christians, Lent is a time to do exactly that.

In recent years, there has been less emphasis on giving up and more emphasis on taking on. Some will choose to go to church more often, carry out random acts of kindness, be more disciplined in bible study and prayer, or join a lent group to share thinking about this time together.

Perhaps we can all think about three things:

First, living in the moment. This is also called mindfulness. All it means is to pay attention to every single moment in the day.

Second, learn to let go. Start to simplify your life, possessions, thoughts, desires and expectations. When you can let go, you are ready to receive all the good things God longs to give you.

Third, develop a habit of thankfulness. The prayer at the start of this piece comes from the Wild Goose Worship Group and is often used in our Thursday morning prayers at St Sampson's church. It can remind us to be thankful for many things, help us appreciate our life day by day and bring us closer to God.

Lent need not be a time to live in guilt or shame. Instead it can be a time when we find ourselves in the place where we pay attention to our feelings – in that place of deep stillness where the hunger of our hearts and the heart of God meet and we can feel his love and peace.
