From the Editor





Focus on Wiltshire Council

The Wiltshire Council budget setting meeting took place on 21 February and as expected, after a ten-hour meeting, the Conservative Administration set the Council Tax for the year at a 4.99% increase, the maximum permitted. This will mean about £60 to £100 increase on your Council Tax.

Additionally there will be an increase for the Police and a long awaited increase for the Fire and Rescue service who have been limited by Central Government for the last five years.

These increases will not cover the expenditure forecast meaning, that to make a legal balanced budget, services will have to be cut back. 52% of your Council Tax is spent on Adult Social Care as Central Government pass more and more responsibility to Wiltshire Council. We will see a further decline in non statutory services such as street cleaning and grass cutting. Services previously financed by Wiltshire Council even in the statutory element will be cut back to the legal minimum.

Two of the biggest hits for Cricklade will be the removal of Wiltshire Council grants of nearly nine thousand pounds to run the Open Door. Cricklade Open Door will have to find this money from other sources for its annual income if it is to survive. In my view, this a very short sighted cut – Open Door offers over eighty elderly residents facilities to ensure their wellbeing and a cooked meal three times a week. The second cut will be to the grant for youth work, cutting the budget to support some of our most challenging young people; there is good evidence that not engaging with these young people leads to increased crime and social problems for them in later life.

With ever decreasing support it is hard to get projects financed. I have received many complaints about the bridleway at the bottom of Pauls Croft leading to the Sustrans track. It is the responsibility of Wiltshire Council to maintain the bridleway but it remains a low priority in their big picture. I am assured that as soon as materials become available (normally old road planning material) they will consider repair. In the meantime they do not consider it dangerous despite the muddy condition. In the same area there are a number of trees backing onto Pauls Croft in need of pollarding. This area of the old railway line is actually in the ownership of Swindon Borough Council and I am endeavouring to find a contact who will take responsibility.

There is some better news for residents at Water Eaton. A reduction in speed and a traffic calming plan has been approved on the C114, A419 to Castle Eaton.

If you are having a problem with Wiltshire Council, the Housing Association, or just need some general advice, I can normally find the right contact or highlight your problem to someone who can help. I have a direct telephone contact to all Officers in Wiltshire Council, and you will be surprised what can happen if you talk to the right person. I cannot promise to fix your problem personally, but I can assist you to resolve it.

PARKING ISSUES IN CRICKLADE

There has been a noticeable increase in the number of parking infringements in the town in recent months. It has now reached the point where pedestrians and other motorists are being put at risk by the selfish behaviour of a small minority of drivers.

Disabled Parking Bays

The marked disabled parking bays in the town are ONLY to be used by legitimate BLUE BADGE HOLDERS at all times. Blue Badge holders must display their parking clock during the posted times. Other motorists MAY NOT use these bays.

Double Yellow Lines

Where there are double yellow lines, YOU MUST NOT PARK AT ANY TIME. However, you may stop briefly to pick up passengers or to drop them off. You may also stop to load or unload, but you must be continuously loading or unloading the whole time you are parked. Such activity is limited to 40 minutes for heavy goods vehicles and 20 minutes for light goods vehicles. Blue Badge holders may park for up to three hours and must display their parking clock.

Proximity to Junctions

YOU MUST NOT stop or park within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space. By doing so, you make it difficult and dangerous for unsighted drivers to pull out from or turn into the side road

Wiltshire Parking Enforcement Officers are aware of the problems and are increasing their presence in the town. Persistent offenders will be reported.

When is Easter?

The problem with Easter is that it moves about. Easter Day is defined as being the first Sunday after the first full moon following the northern spring equinox. That might sound complicated ... and it probably is! But if you saw the Diary in last month's Chronicle the equinox was on Monday 12 March, and the full moon that month was on 7 March. The first full moon after the equinox is on 6 April which is a Thursday. The first Sunday after is 9 April – there it is, Easter Sunday!

The other facts about the date of Easter Sunday is that it cannot be before 21 March – that's about the date of the equinox itself and it's got to be after the equinox – not at the same time as it. It can't be later than 25 April. Why not? Well, a lunation (the time between a full moon and the next) is 29 days, 12 hours, 44 minutes and 3 seconds. Add a week (7 days) as the lunation is just over 29 calendar days, so 36 days. And how many days from 21 March to 25 April? Why, 36 days! (That's including both days, so the start of one to the end of the other.)

Knowing the period of a lunation, we can calculate the date of full moons quite precisely. All you need is one starting point. This year, the first full moon after the spring equinox is at 5.34am on 6 April (British Summer Time, Cricklade). With a pencil and paper you can now work out all the moon phases and the date of Easter for years to come ... but it might be easier with a spreadsheet!

That's all true in the west.

Countries that use the Orthodox calendar celebrate Easter on a different day. Go on holiday to Greece in the spring and you might find Easter celebrated when you don't expect it. The reason is that all the Orthodox churches calculate Easter based on the Hebrew calendar. Easter can fall anywhere between 4 April and 8 May, and is the Sunday following the first full moon after Passover. In the bible, Christ entered Jerusalem to celebrate Passover, on what we call Palm Sunday, which led to his arrest and crucifixion.

Now we need to know when Passover will be. It sounds easy as Passover is on the 15th day of Nisan, the Hebrew month of the start of spring. But it's not that easy. The Hebrew calendar is a lunar calendar, not the solar one used worldwide as a common dating system. A lunation is twenty-nine and a half days, give or take. That means that the Hebrew calendar of 12 months has months of 29 or 30 days, 29.5 on average. $29.5 \times 12 = 354$ days. So their calendar falls behind the solar (Gregorian) calendar by about 11 days every year.

How does that work then? There are 12 months in the Hebrew year, and every year the calendar falls behind the sun by 11 days. Every three years is a whole month out of place. I'm oversimplifying here but every three years or so an extra month is added. The last month of Adar would be repeated as Adar II. So Nisan, the month after, suddenly jumps 33 days $(11 \times 3 = 33)$ backwards. So does the calculation of eastern Easter.

Sometimes Passover, western Easter and eastern Easter will fall at the same time. Not always. Watch the moon!

Cricklade in the 1950s Harry Giles' High Street store

In the fifties, an indirect beneficiary from the sale of garage owner L.O. Hammond's assets after his business collapsed, was builder Harry Giles and his store at No. 48 High Street. Thanks mainly to his regular supply of construction



work for the Co-op estate post-war, Harry, and his brother, Dick, bought L.O. Hammond's former workshop from Sid Giles, the butcher at No. 49.

These large premises, situated past the three old cottages on the north side of Gas Lane, had been where Mr Hammond had kept his special cars, and had rebuilt the Town Clock after it was knocked down by a military vehicle in 1946.

Behind this building a paddock ran to the rear of No. 48 giving Harry immediate access from his shop to the workshop. Here he stored building materials for sale; timber, glass,



rand etc. He then added a vast selection of ironmongery, hardware and household items to the shop itself; even fruit and vegetables eventually.

Business remained so brisk that for years to come it was said locally that if you couldn't find what you needed at Harry Giles' store you wouldn't find it anywhere!

Anyone who'd like to tend, care and cosset an elephant (they are only pretend ones) please let me know.



Donation from Purton Parish Council

We are very pleased to let you know that we have received a grant from Purton Parish Council of £2,994.00 for the purchase of a Fractional Exhaled Nitric Oxide (FeNO) machine. This is a novel medical technology used to aid in the diagnosis of asthma. FeNO devices measure fractional exhaled nitric oxide in the breath of patients. Nitric oxide is a biomarker for asthma which provides an indication of the level of inflammation in the lungs. FeNO testing produces a FeNO score which gives a value to the level of inflammation and can therefore be used to aid clinicians in the diagnosis of asthma. Although the FeNO is primarily a diagnostic tool, it has an additional use in the ongoing monitoring of chronic asthma.



Will we have saved them up in order to raise the roof (obviously not literally!) as we worship on Easter morning, or will our praise be tempered by how we are feeling and responding to our world right now?

Whatever words are used to describe Jesus it must be said that he was a realist, he understood all that made life difficult for most people at the time, he knew what it was like to live under a conquering power and to be subjected to rules and laws that were unfair.

We tend to overlook that fact, possibly because it may change our narrative, our expectations of Jesus, whereas the truth may be a source of strength and support right now.

Very few would deny that life is not easy; from local, national, and global perspectives we find ourselves in situations not of our own making and seemingly powerless to change them right now. It seems that now saying Alleluia might not be that difficult after all...

As Christians we know that our faith is based very strongly on hope and we believe in the power of hope, what it can achieve, how it can change things for the good of all; and the Easter story, the Resurrection is full of hope. If ever we have cause to shout Alleluia as loudly as we can it is on the day when we witness the love of God, so great that it defeated death itself, so great that it raised his son, our Lord and Saviour from the dead.

I can go through Lent without a Alleluia but on Easter Day itself I will shout out the word as often as I can, in praise and thanksgiving to the God whose love withstood the horrors of the cross and I invite you all to join me in doing so.
