



#### Annual Town Meeting - Tuesday 16 April 2024

This year the Annual Town Meeting is on Tuesday 16 April 2024 at 7pm in the Town Hall. It is an opportunity for you to hear from Councillors who will give presentations on the Council's activities and to let you know a bit about what is planned for the next 12 months. The Annual Community Awards will be presented at this meeting. There will also an opportunity to meet and hear from community groups and individuals on matters that are of local importance, so please make a date in your diary now for this informative annual event.

Everyone is welcome to attend, and refreshments will be served from 6.30pm. During the evening there will be plenty of opportunities for you to ask questions. These can be lodged in advance (by Thursday 7 April please) if it is likely that your question would need research to answer fully.

#### Why not become a Councillor?

This is your chance to influence the important decisions in Cricklade and the Town Council is the local authority closest to the electorate. Each councillor has personal reasons for running but the role offers the chance to make a huge difference to the quality of life for people in your area. Being an effective councillor requires both commitment and hard work and we are looking for suitable candidates to fulfil this interesting and varied voluntary role.

The submission deadline date is 19 April, and then on 29 April the Full Town Council will vote to co-opt one name from the applications received. The application form can be downloaded from the website or a hard copy can be collected from our office.

#### **Nesting Season**

Some mature hedgerows are protected by law, but this would not normally apply to garden hedges. The RSPB recommend not cutting hedges and trees between March and August as this is the main breeding season for nesting birds, although some birds may nest outside this period.





It is an offence under Section 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 to intentionally take, damage or destroy the nest of any wild bird while it is in use or being built, or to intentionally kill, injure or take chicks or adults, or intentionally take or destroy any eggs. If someone is cutting a hedge during this period, politely mention the risk to bird's nests, and the law protecting nests. If they proceed, and you know there is an active nest at risk, contact the police on 101, and ask for a reference number.

## Leave a Legacy to Cricklade

Wayland Estates Charity would appreciate residents of Cricklade considering making a donation or leaving a gift in their will to the Charity.

**WHY?** Currently, Wayland Estates Charity gives approximately £10,000 per annum to community groups. The Charity has a limited amount of capital, providing a small amount of income, with little opportunity for growth. In future we would like to be able increase our income allowing us to help more groups and support bigger projects.

**We started in 1551!** Wayland Estates Charity was originally set up in 1551 when the income was used to maintain the highways of Cricklade. In the 18th, 19th, and 20th centuries the charity funded some street lighting and helped maintain the Jubilee clock. Any surplus monies were given to the local authorities to help reduce rates. From 1976, with the approval of the Charities Commission, the income has been used to help local groups with grants for capital items.

**Who are we?** There is a committee of twelve Cricklade residents who, as Trustees, meet twice a year to decide the grant awards and to maintain the running of the charity.

**Who do we help?** Examples of projects that have been supported are machinery for the Cricket Club, equipment for the Town Band, a gate at the Jenner Hall, the Clock at St Mary's, mirrors in the Dance Studio at the Leisure Centre. Our grants, given for capital projects not for running costs, enable groups to provide a community facility that may otherwise be lost in the future without valuable support.

It is hoped that you may like to donate now or leave a legacy in your will for the benefit of Cricklade and the future of Cricklade. Wayland Estates Charity is the perfect way to do this by adding to the Charity's capital and ensuring a healthy future income with which to help groups supporting everyone in Cricklade.



## Cricklade's D-Day Memories - Part 1

On 6 June 2024 the country will mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day. During WW2, Cricklade people could recall in detail many local incidents leading up to it from a very personal viewpoint.

In 1940, far from being a quiet backwater during WW2, Cricklade was in an extremely vulnerable position both by road and by rail. Its two main streets lay on one of the most vital routes for the military to transport troops and supplies from the midlands and the north to the south coast, and was heavily used by tanks and other armoured vehicles through the very heart of town. This traffic was further increased by American convoys driving continually through the High Street and Calcutt Street, usually bound for Southampton. They flattened the pavements as they tore around the then much narrower corner opposite the clock, with stones flying everywhere and making it extremely dangerous for pedestrians to cross the road.

Furthermore, following the London Blitz, in 1940 and 1941, sustained air attacks by the Luftwaffe were steadily increasing further and further north from the south. Local people were well aware of these terrifying nightly incursions by the drone of mass formations of bombers flying overhead and later targeting major British towns and cities with devastating effect – but things were going to get worse!

Local people, including those who were children at the time, still have unforgettable memories of the very real threat of air attacks over Cricklade in broad daylight. Often, German planes which still had bombs on board, would jettison them indiscriminately onto the countryside below as they returned from a raid elsewhere, and the railway line through Cricklade was a very tempting target.

One very frightening incident occurred when several bombs were dropped by one aircraft close to the railway line just beyond Pauls Croft followed by others near Ox House Farm (east of the back road to Swindon). Children could actually see the enemy's plane coming up over the Bottom School, and then flying so low near the railway bridge that the pilot's face was clearly visible. Another recalls how one morning from her bedroom window in Spital Lane, she saw the pilot of another low flying German plane attempting to machine-gun a man on a motor bike somewhere in Calcutt. Fortunately, he jumped into a ditch and survived, but once again the plane had been following the railway line ...

## The Final Word ...

On the island of Iona, just off the west coast of Scotland, there is a religious community which brings together Christians of many different traditions. Every week the community undertakes a short pilgrimage across the island to a small chapel beside a cemetery. When all have gathered in the chapel these words are read: "In the Christian Church we celebrate that it was in a graveyard that the resurrection faith began; and it is often in places of death and apparent hopelessness that new beginnings are given."

That simple, yet powerful, act of worship reminds all who take part in it that Christians are an Easter People, filled with the new life which God brings out of death. Such reminders are necessary because we live in a society which acts as if: Christ has died; Christ is buried; Christ is gone forever. To this climate of despair Christians bring the hope of Easter. Christ is risen and God is at work renewing the whole of creation.

The signs of the new creation which the resurrection proclaims are visible whenever we see the power of love at work. We ourselves might be on the receiving end of the transforming power of love, or a loving action of our own changes another person's situation. Perhaps we hear of someone whose feeling of worthlessness is changed into new self-confidence when a friend tells them how much they need them, or we come across an estranged father and son brought together by mutual forgiveness.

Such experiences are glimpses of God's new creation. They are signs of a reality which lies beyond the limits of this old creation but in which, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, we already have a share.
