Amongst the regular natural visitors listed were damselflies, dung flies, large white butterflies, along with those less well known such as mink, water shrew and long eared bats.

We are truly blessed that we live in an area with such biodiversity, and natural beauty. We are also fortunate that we have The Court Leet, Natural England and the Floodplain Meadows Partnership to help protect this valuable flood meadow for future generations.

#### D Day Beacon Lighting

The Commemoration of the D Day landings was well attended as the Cricklade Beacon was lit at Saxons Rest, Waylands on Thursday 6 June 2024. Cricklade Band put on a rousing accompaniment with a fitting amount of ceremony befitting those who lost their lives, so that we might enjoy ours.

#### **Dog Fouling**

Can we please remind all our pet loving residents to clean up after their pets. Between Cricklade Town Council and Wiltshire Council, there are over 45 bins, all of which can be used for the disposal of waste.

This includes the seasonal bins on Fairview Fields, which this year were delayed in opening due to the wet weather. We can only open these bins when the ground is dry enough to drive the collection vehicle to them without causing damage to the subsoil and ancient furrows. As you can imagine, these bins hold quite a weight even though they are emptied twice a week, it would be a health and safety issue to have to manhandle them back to the waiting vehicle.

#### Cricklade Neighbourhood Plan 2026 - 2038

Cricklade Neighbourhood Plan Review, which took place in late May with resident help and opinions, is now being collated and appraised. The results will be condensed into the New Neighbourhood Plan 2026 - 2038 and will be in the Council Offices for viewing later in the year.

#### Wiltshire Perspective

As I write this we're just getting going on the election trail. When *The Chronicle* lands through your letterbox it will be a few days from ending. Whatever your politics, I would encourage everyone to vote. Millions of people have died for us to have that freedom to do so.

On the subject of democracy, I went to my first Full Council meeting last week, which was a confusing mixture of ceremony and business, teamwork and point-scoring. Whatever the colour of the politics, I'm very clear about the priorities I need to be voting towards, and that's for all of the residents that I represent. If it's not concerning our communities I'll vote with the Liberal Group in County Hall, which includes a significant amount of WhatsApp messages that provide commentaries during the meeting.

The meeting was considered to be one of the shorter Full Council meetings of the year, lasting about five hours. People were elected to their various positions. I was selected to serve on the Health Select Committee, so I'll let you know more about that when I've learnt the ropes there.

The points others were making were very varied, conflicting and valid, (depending on where you start from). Where I'm not sure about what the local opinions are, I will seek out people's views and thoughts, so if you have a topic that's concerning you, please feel free to inform me of your views. Even if I disagree with you I will still respect your thoughts and try and help.

On another topic, I went to a Local Highways and Footpaths Improvement Group (LHFIG) meeting, where relative priorities were selected for the year ahead. It's restricted to the Royal Wootton Bassett and Cricklade Area Board, and our division fared relatively well, thanks to the support and lobbying from other Crickladians (who also rooted for Latton's wish list). Despite all the best intentions from everybody there, there's only so much cake to go round, quite rightly.

Also, Cricklade's Local Neighbourhood Plan is in need of refreshing. This is what Wiltshire Council will take into account when future developments and planning applications are considered and the review means you get to have your say. In the first instance, go to the Town Council's website and follow the Neighbourhood Plan Review link.

In the meantime, I'm grateful to the people who have been asking me for help, and in the majority of cases I've been able to find the right person to address their issues. Most of them will take their time to run their course, and the outcome may not be the one the resident was wanting; but trying and failing is better than not trying or even worse giving up.

#### **Prospect Hospice**

A local support group for Prospect Hospice is holding a Coffee Morning on Saturday 29 June starting at 10am in Cricklade

All proceeds will go to Prospect Hospice.



The Wroughton-based charity is facing a critical financial shortfall that threatens the independent specialist end-of-life service provider. Despite providing care to over 2,000 patients and their families last year, entirely free of charge, rising costs and stagnant government funding have left Prospect Hospice £1 million short of what is needed this year.

Charlotte Forrest, the new director of income generation at Prospect Hospice, emphasises the gravity of the situation: "The gap in our funding is a serious threat to the vital services we provide. We urgently need the support of our community to continue offering the high level of care and support that our patients and their families rely on.

"Since I joined the team here in February, I've been blown away by the determination and generosity of our supporters, patients, their families, and our community. Last year Prospect Hospice cared for more than 2,000 patients completely free of charge. and the truth is, we simply couldn't do that without support from the public."

With prices rising rapidly and more people than ever needing care, the charity is urging the community to help bridge the financial gap. Even small donations can make a significant difference in ensuring that families like Sinéad and Harry's receive the care they need during the toughest times of their lives. The photo shows them on their wedding day.

"Harry was a rare case – he was just 25," says Sinéad. "His cancer caused paralysis, so from the beginning, the hospice's physio team was involved. Their ability to adapt and tailor the service

was incredible. They came to our house and provided a positive focus for him every day, giving us structure, routine, and hope during a devastating time. I don't know how we'd have managed without them."

Sinead continues to advocate and fund raise for the hospice, understanding deeply the devastating consequences of service cuts. "It's my worst fear because I know how much our family depended on them."

You can support your local hospice by giving a one-off donation or setting up a regular donation. £25 could pay for an hour of support at home from a nurse, £60 could pay for an hour of a patient's stay on its in-patient unit or £100 could pay for a series of specialist physio sessions.





In the May issue of *The Chronicle*, I made an appeal for more drivers to help both Cricklade Link and Cricklade Open Door provide their different transport services to the people of Cricklade and Latton who rely on them.

Three of you very kindly responded and are now helping out. It is so much appreciated and great to have new drivers. You know who you are, thank you.

Cricklade Link still needs more drivers and Cricklade Open Door now needs some more escorts to help on the minibus.

**For Open Door** we now have enough drivers to make the minibus driving rota happily workable, but we need some more people to act as escorts for people using the minibus. This involves helping them on and off the bus as well as out of, and back into, their homes. To remind you, this is a role in which you choose which day or days you want to help. So if you have some spare time it is a rewarding and wonderful way to contribute directly to other residents' well being.

**For Cricklade Link** we are so grateful to have additional drivers who have already started helping. However, we still need another five or six drivers to be able to meet the demand.

It is so disappointing having to turn down requests from people who need our help. In the past we rarely had to do this but this year we have had to turn down ten jobs so far because of driver shortage.

So, please, can you do your bit, give some of your time, and get our driver numbers back up to where they need to be? Again as a reminder, you choose which jobs you take according to your own time availability, so this is not a sort of open-ended onerous commitment. You are in control. In addition, you receive both 45p per mile to cover your vehicle costs and the certain knowledge that your gift of time has truly helped someone. It is win win.

## Cricklade 100 Years Ago Hammond's Garage (Calcutt Street).

The first commercial garage in town, Established c1920.

Ray Ellam b.1918 recalled, 'In the 1930s when I worked at Hammond's garage in Calcutt Street there were still a few Ford



Model T vehicles around, and we occasionally repaired them. Other mechanics worked mainly on the service and repair of Alvis cars, in particular the Alvis Silver Eagle model, a very high quality vehicle. In 1934 the Ford V8 came out with its smooth and powerful engine, and some customers changed to these. I thought it a bad choice since the Ford had inferior suspension, braking and handling, but was cheaper than the Alvis. Most cars in the 1930s were of similar construction, so not difficult to understand – no



electronic gadgets in those days – but one Cricklade newsagent owned a Trojan. This was most unusual as its engine and transmission were horizontal under the front seat, chain driven to a solid rear axle, so no differential. The engine was also unusual in that it was a four-cylinder two-stroke in square formation, with each pair of pistons having a common combustion chamber.

Some Trojans had solid tyres, and others pneumatics. In the 1920s and 30s, these cars were popular as the cheapest, but since some garages could not understand their unusual construction, they would exhibit notices saying "No Trojans." '





### The Final Word ...

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." John 14:27

Well, what's next? This thought has often crossed my mind when one season of my life ends and I can't see what's coming.

After leaving secondary school, I thought, What's next? I felt worried about going to college but excited about the freedom I expected to experience. Starting working life, getting married all are taking steps into the unknown. Becoming a parent, being responsible for the welfare of a tiny vulnerable child and then watching as they become independent and not knowing what lies ahead for them. These and many more times in my life are Well, what's next? times.

Whether we're ready for a season to change or not, it can be worrying. However, I am so thankful we serve a God who is the author of peace and not confusion.

Jesus shared the words quoted above from John's Gospel with His disciples in the upper room right before the chaos of Judas' betrayal and the tragedy of Jesus' death. The disciples didn't know the miracles coming their way, but they did know Jesus told them not to fear. He offered them peace, even when the future was unknown.

When we invite Jesus into our hearts, we're given His peace through the Holy Spirit. And if we put our trust in God rather than feeling stressed we can have His peace. Whether you're leaving school, as many of our young people are just now, entering a competitive job market, beginning or ending a significant relationship, moving to a new place, or something else, you can experience the peace of His presence.

This peace doesn't promise us all the answers, but it reminds us that even when we don't know where we're going, we know who we're following. Through consistently praying and continually inviting Jesus into our future, we can experience the peace that comes from knowing that every bad thing can become a good thing if we make it a God thing.

We don't have to live anxiously when we don't know what tomorrow will bring. Instead, seek God, who knows our future. He is making a way for you and me, and His will is greater than our plans. Let's prayerfully ask Him to lead us to His best and trust Him.
