Wiltshire Perspective

Three topics this month

- Change of Control in Wiltshire
- My new roles
- Connect

After the election I thought everything would calm down. I was wrong. The result of no overall control meant a lot of negotiation (in which I played no part) but the outcome of which was that those who previously ran things and had built up a close relationship with officers, were going to change as a result of a number of knife edge votes. The benefit to my mind is that it enforces a collaborative approach and ensures we have to reach out to colleagues and support has to be not just earned, but also maintained.

The implications took time to analyse and there were many appointments to fill and dozens of roles that had to be finalised.

My primary focus in all this is always the residents of our Division. Having said that, one issue that has been brought to my attention is flooding and water quality. So I guess that being offered that position as the portfolio holder for the whole of Wiltshire means I can represent residents for whom that is an issue a stronger voice than previously.

As I can engage directly with senior officers about problems and seek out what support is available to us, for example assistance in pulling together our flood plans, and resources to our corner of Wiltshire, I can ensure we get our fair share of attention.

Also, last month I mentioned that Latton Parish Council were having problems. I am really impressed with how well they have organised themselves and a new Parish Council is due to be in place by the time of publication. I know that it's not easy to make an appointment in Trowbridge and to physically go there to have the forms vetted. It's something I hope will be simplified in future.

Another new role, but this is temporary, is that I will be chairing the Area Board for the first year, as well as the LHFIG (small improvements to roads, cycleways and footpaths). We have set the priorities with the available budget, trying to be fair to everyone and to maximise that impact for the limited budget that was left to us to work with.

Lastly, if you fancy a lift in a large chauffeur-driven limo for the princely sum of £2, I might point you towards our new Connect service. So long as it doesn't follow a bus route, and is between 6am to 8pm weekdays (8-7.30 weekends) you can book a ride and travel within a reasonable area. So if you want to go to Royal Wootton Bassett or Malmesbury for lunch or tea, this sounds ideal. You can book it through the Wiltshire Connect App or call 01225 712900.

Many thanks again. It's a privilege helping people, and if you think I can help you, please do get in touch and I'll see what I can do.


PPG purchase



600th Issue

A milestone ... and we celebrate it. And all those who made it possible.

I was told that the names of the people involved were lost in the mists of time, but for a few memories. However I was pointed by Pam Debenham in the direction of the Museum in Calcutt Street. There, Paul Marley and Mary Coole directed me into the Vestry, the room used for archive books and similar items.

I spent an interesting two hours there looking through a long shelf of copies of *The Chronicle* going back to Issue 1 of February 1975 (cover pictured right). I discovered that the original title was Cricklade Chronicle – at some much later stage the town name was dropped, though it remains in people's memory. It was to be a united journal by St Augustine's Catholic Church, Cricklade United Church, St Sampson's and St John the Baptist,



Latton, known as Cricklade Churches Together. The United Church ceased their "Message" magazine and St Sampson's and Latton stopped the "Parish Magazine."

The first issue didn't actually list any "credits" but it was apparent that Rev Ken Withington was the instigator if not named as editor. It was printed on a desktop lithographic machine and hand stapled. Looking at it in the flesh, so to speak, it was originally printed on quarto paper – an old Imperial size slightly larger in width and height than A5 – and stapled on the left hand edge. The print run was 1,250 copies and it was only eight pages. There was a Minister's Letter, by a different incumbent each month: no.1 by Paul Spilsby; issue 2 by Stella Beard; 3 by Ken Withington; 4 by Paul again. And so on. (The Minister's Letter was renamed "The Final Word" in issue 301 in January 2000 marking a new era.)

Issue no.1 also featured a *Cricklade Personality* column, in that case being Reg Coole, then Chairman of Cricklade Town Council. This was only an irregular piece as the next one wasn't until May 1975, with George Yeates, who had just retired as churchwarden from St Sampson's.

Issue no.2 started with the Editorial question "Why a Town Plan for Cricklade?" We're still trying to get our heads around that some 50 years later! (It's called the Neighbourhood Plan now though.) May 1975 introduced a Christian Aid campaign feature. That is a recurrent theme in our pages, too. And sadly still a recurrent problem around the world.

In July 1975, the magazine started printing publication details: this addition made my scroll through the next 50 years so much easier! Items for publication went either to Ken Withington (tel: Cricklade 300), or Geoff Haslam (tel: Cricklade 785). The format of those phone numbers show how much else has changed in that 50 years! The

publisher was named as The Cricklade and Latton Churches. The printer was Stads of 7 London Street, Swindon. In around 1978, Stads moved to 9 East Street in Swindon then later to Faringdon Road. Their trading name changed eventually to Quill Press, still at East Street, and run by Trevor Cockbill and Margaret Sanders. They ran the print business behind their shop where they sold stationery and associated items.

Before February 1985, the former Roman Catholic Church of St Augustine's had moved its congregation to St Mary's in the High Street. The vacated building, itself formerly a Baptist Chapel (built 1852), was bought by Cricklade Town Council for the new museum. That explains why I was reading that issue (no.121) in the Vestry! The former museum had been in the old town weighbridge, the building close to the road by the Town Hall but those premises were too small for the collection.

In that same issue I learnt that the Parish Hall (Jenner Hall) Save It Club was around then but the monthly prize was a £50 Petrol Voucher!

In November 1986 (issue 144) we have the first mention of a separate Advertising Manager, John Williams.

I've always loved colour and issue 179 in December 1989 introduced it in a limited way. It was only for that Christmas issue, and a couple of occasions later, but titling on the front and back page was in RED. As a printer myself in a former existence, I know that the process involved in those days for that sort of print run was to put each page through the printer twice: first with an image for the black without the red present; then change the ink drum to red and run them all through again with only the colour text present. And repeat for the reverse side. Very time consuming and very prone to spoilt sheets!

January 1990 (issue 180): Cricklade had grown in those fifteen years and so had *The Chronicle*, both in size and number. While no.1 had 8 pages and a run of 1,400, by 1990 the issues had some 18 pages and a print run of 1,775. It became more economical to print *The Chronicle* on single sheets which were then stapled together.

In June 1994, the magazine format changed to A4 size. The old Imperial quarto paper size was difficult to get hold of and metric sizes had become the norm and therefore cheaper.

From issue 240 in December 1994, Allan Webster was named as printer, operating from Cricklade. Michael Lucas took over as Advertising Manager in 1998. That role passed to Roy Phillips in 2000 and then John Coole from January 2008.

No 301 ushered in the new millennium with the introduction of the A5 booklet size that we have today.

The editorship changed several times between the 1990s and the 2020s:

July 1992 (issue 211) – Sally Mason

August 1999 (no.296) – Clare Flanagan

May 2001 (no.317) – Susan Rands

October 2003 (no.346) – Becky Curtis

August 2005 (no.368) – Fenella Dernie

November 2012 (no.455) – (anonymous)

During the Covid years, the viability of the magazine was maintained by Covid Recovery Grant funding from Wiltshire Community Foundation. The distributors did a fantastic job continuing deliveries under difficult circumstances.

Continues over ...

It had become obvious by the end of 2021 that the January issue was unsustainable – all the Christmas information was in the December issue and no one wanted to write much in the run-up needed for a January issue. It was also a lot to ask of our distributors to deliver in the cold and the dark of late December. Issue 561 became a joint December/January issue.

I became editor with the February 2022 issue (no.562). The major changes at this point were the photo on the front cover (still in black and white) and the introduction of the Chronicle Diary summarising events in the month into one place. A kind sponsorship by the late Tony Jepps allowed us to introduce a colour cover from February 2023 (issue 573). We have continued to be able to produce a colour cover, funded by a grant from Wayland Estates Charity during 2024 and income from a premium rate for colour advertising on the other 3 faces of the cover.

Through much of the history of *The Chronicle*, distribution was organised by Peter and Margaret Rickards, collecting magazines from the printers and bagging or boxing them up for individual distributor routes. This task was taken over by Allan and Nicky at Webster Printing some years ago. Nicky is also our current Advertising Manager.

Allan tells me that, in its hey day, *The Chronicle* consisted of up to 60 pages A5. For the technically minded, the black and white inside is now printed on a Hamada 500 CDA press and collated, stitched and folded on a Horizon AC 1200 booklet maker. The number of copies printed is currently some 2,250 per month, eleven months a year. The cover is out-sourced to Trade Print Ltd. That artwork is sent electronically to them on about the first of the month, and received in time to combine it together with the inside pages!

The magazine is still published by Cricklade Churches Together but the editor has a fairly free rein on the content, so long as it is appropriate and space is allowed for church based organisations. I am indebted to our proof reader, Phillipa Knight, who casts her eyes over the final "copy" often picking up errors that become invisible when I've read and re-read half a dozen times!

Once upon a time, profits from the magazine were split three ways between the churches at the annual Churches Together AGM. These days, production costs have soared, both in terms of paper prices and the number of copies increasing. We still deliver free to all homes in Cricklade and Latton. Most if not all the funding comes from our advertisers. We cover our costs but without profit.

Of course nothing would be possible if we didn't have our wonderful team of pre-press, printing, advertising and distribution. Without all of them there is no magazine!

The Final Word ...

What a lovely milestone to celebrate – 600 issues of The Chronicle. Many congratulations to everyone who has been involved over the years! And our thanks to Rick and the team for all they do now.

I wonder how you feel about anniversaries? Some we love – it is my birthday in July, so that is a moment which is celebrated. We remembered the 80th anniversary of VE day together in May which is a poignant remembrance: grateful for the end, but remembering all that had been lost. May is also the anniversary of my father's death, an anniversary of gratitude and something like wistfulness (ten years on). Sometimes anniversaries are a moment to look back, and sometimes they are a springboard for all that is to come.

I suspect that we are often in a mixed state of looking back and looking forward. But we don't want to live in the past – we'd miss the present – nor live in the future and ignore the past.

When I think about God, he is from everlasting to everlasting, so that is looking both ways! And he is the author of all, and lovingly sustains all, so he is definitely present. And so I wonder what the future is with God? Our future is often a question of trust, and sometimes the questions of trust are the hardest.

So as we thank God for 600 editions of The Chronicle and all that has involved and, as we look ahead to what is to come, let us (in the words used at VE80 and quoted by George VI): "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way".
