

Welcome

Skateboard Activity Sessions

Please can you ensure that footpaths are kept clear of overhanging trees and hedges, and that undergrowth is not allowed to encroach onto footpaths. We have had several instances of brambles and stinging nettles encroaching onto paths causing injury, and impassable footpaths in recent weeks.

We would like to express our thanks to Cricklade Bloomers for their floral displays that decorate the length of the High Street and the four corners of the town. Let's not forget the Council's own Grounds Team, Matt, Michael, David and Adam for their hard work in keeping the hanging baskets and all these other displays watered. Wiltshire Council - How do you report Complaints?

The Town Council is often contacted by residents who have a complaint, many of these issues are the responsibility of Wiltshire Council. Wiltshire Council is responsible for: resolving issues with dead animals at the verge, with drains and manholes, dog mess, fly-posting, fly-tipping, footpaths, pavements and kerbs (including weeds), graffiti, oil and debris on the roads, overhanging bushes and trees, pedestrian crossings, potholes, public litter bins, roads (inc. closures and diversions), salt bins, street lighting, street litter and sweeping.

To report an issue to Wiltshire Council, log on to the MyWiltshire app and complete the online form at My Wiltshire (www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywiltshire-online-reporting) QR Code right. If

you do not have online access, telephone 0300 456 0100.

Wiltshire Perspective

Three topics this month

- Bedding into the role
- Flooding & Community Resilience
- County Finances

A change of administration in County Hall has several different paces, the newly elected people get new laptops and badges in a few minutes. The new leader got elected in a few weeks, the detailed lower roles soon followed. Last month I mentioned that flooding and water quality were a focus for me, as well as chairing the Area Board for this year. The skills and knowledge required to perform those roles takes a little longer.

I am gradually learning the dimensions of the role and how the various moving parts work together. The flood summit held in March was very timely and as a result of that we are meeting with stakeholders in a focused and prioritised way. Cricklade recently set up a resilience working group which, when I presented to officers and our colleagues in Gloucestershire, showed us to be significantly ahead of some other communities' plans. This is reassuring, but means the work we do is harder because we're doing the heavy lifting from which others can benefit.

The scope of my flooding role is for the whole of Wiltshire, which is a much larger place than I had appreciated! There are expectations that Wiltshire Council will sort out all manner of problems, especially at this time of year to prepare for another wet winter but County Hall's perspective and capacity may fall short of that, because it is every householder who has the primary responsibility to do what they can to defend their house against flooding.

Flooding is also a prime example where issues far beyond one's own home can impact you, and you might similarly impact others, often unknowingly, for example if you weren't aware of responsibilities when you bought the property, to clear ditches. It shows how we need to be mindful, considerate and adaptable depending on the circumstances of those around you.

The budget for funding flood schemes is changing, and being simplified, but there's no mention of there being more funding available unfortunately.

Wiltshire Council's current budget was set by the previous administration, which overran slightly, (but could have been better planned for), so as is the tradition of these things, the new administration blames the old one for the state of the finances. A not unreasonable defence being that they expected to retain control, but now someone else is sleeping in the bed of their making.

However, the change of administration will probably not cause a sea-change in the County's spending envelope. It's what we have collectively voted for over a number of years. So claiming that we should now cut the fat, for example the roles of equal opportunity employment managers is simply wrong, there aren't any. I don't believe there's Continues over ...

anyone in receipt of your council tax money that isn't working at full capacity or more.

Many thanks again, especially to those who have reached out to me, I have a full in tray and I apologise if it's taken me some time to respond to you, but it's a privilege help you. If you think I can help you, please do get in touch, or feel free to chase me and I'll do my best.

No meeting in August

Our gardening year starts in March with our AGM and in the ensuing months we have had excellent speakers on a wide range of topics.



Our March speaker was Kate Holton of the Fern and Ivy shop in Cirencester and who gave us many useful hints and tips on growing indoor plants successfully. The whisper of pens on paper as members scribbled notes as she spoke was proof that many of us really needed Kate's advice.

The majority of us have small gardens so every plant has to prove its worth. In April, Marion Stainton gave us an excellent, informative talk on plants that extend interest throughout the year in a small garden. Marion has recently downsized from a large garden, so spoke from experience.

Also in May we had our annual Plant Fair in the Town Hall. It was very successful with lots of plants sold to delighted gardeners who went on to sample delicious refreshments from the WI in the Annexe. Many thanks also to other stall holders who helped make it a great community morning.

In June we had a remarkable talk by Charlotte Hitchmough, a Director of Action for the River Kennet (ARK). She graphically described the critical state of our rivers. For historic reasons the run-off from our roofs goes into our sewerage system, so the torrential rain we sometimes experience overwhelms the treatment plants and our rivers are polluted. Our chalk streams, almost unique in the world, are particularly vulnerable. What can we do? Make rain gardens! Go to Charlotte's website to learn how to do this.

In July, Michelle of Page Green Flowers, gave us a delightful talk on growing cut flowers and explained the importance of all of us buying home grown seasonal flowers. The flower arrangements she created as she spoke were beautiful.

Our next meeting is on **9 September**: Philip Aubrey's talk entitled "Keep Them in Shape: The Why, When and How to Prune." Philip will give us a practical demonstration so it will be the perfect talk for preparation for autumn.



Stock levels have been slowly decreasing during this year. In January 2025 the amount of stock we had was 1,601kg. By May 2025 (the latest figures available) we were down to 1,007kg. In May we gave out 1,311kg of stock. As you can see, your donations are very necessary. We would struggle without them. Our usual collection points are: Tesco, Animal Fayre (pet shop), Culverhay Stores, St Sampson's School (during term time) and the local churches.







V.J. Day: 15 August 1945

There is a misconception by many that the Second World War ended on 8 May 1945 ... and everyone went home.

Even in Europe, that wasn't true. In many ways it was the end of one phase and the beginning of policing work and changes in policies to create a different future and a different mindset.

But the war went on in the Far East and (however much the propaganda says it was solely driven by the Americans), British, Australian, New Zealand, Indian and other Empire forces were heavily enmired in the inch-by-inch war advance against Japanese forces.

The US Manhattan Project to develop the Atom Bomb, was initially intended as a means for the ending of the European war, as Germany had been developing that armaments technology itself. As it happened, and whatever you may feel about the rights and wrongs of it, it was decided at that time that more allied servicemen's lives would be saved by dropping a uranium bomb on Hiroshima, than by not doing so. It was expected that the Japanese Empire would surrender that same day – 8.15am on 6 August 1945. Perhaps 120,000 people were killed within the first four days following the blast. Many others died afterwards from the effects of burns and radiation. Japan refused the demand for capitulation.

Three days later, on 9 August, a plutonium bomb was dropped on the city of Nagasaki. Over 2 square miles of the city were pulverised and some 73,000 people killed.

On 10 August, Japan agreed to talks towards conditional surrender and by the 14th accepted the demand for unconditional surrender. The following day was declared "Victory over Japan" or VJ Day, although it was not until 2 September that the final Japanese surrender was signed, thereby bringing the Second World War to a formal close.

Closing a war does not bring closure and perhaps one personal memory from the 1950s will suffice. I was living in Forest Gate, London E7, aged 6 in 1957, and a family lived opposite that my mother would visit from time to time. Let's call them the Smiths.

During school holidays, Mum would occasionally take me round to see Mrs Smith who would offer us a cup of weak tea with sterilised milk. (It was awful.) But I gathered from these visits that Mr Smith was upstairs, and would never come down. He had been a prisoner of war in a Japanese work camp and "liberated" by the Allies at the end of the war. He had suffered during the war and, although I was never allowed to know the reasons, was still suffering over 12 years later.

You may take your own view over the use of atomic bombs to end the war in Japan.

You may take your own view on recent actions to prevent Iran from developing these munitions.

You may want to consider the current ownership of nuclear armaments by states of rather dubious character.

We must though remember that the technology cannot be disinvented.

I have recounted some of my father's war stories in previous issues (June 2024, May and June 2025). He survived going in on D-minus-1 to Normandy, and not being blown up in a job he didn't get (Yangtze 1949).

He also passed to me a bullet which I still have at home. As 2nd Lieutenant on his motor gun boat he, among all the crew, was rostered on Oerlikon gun watch for German plane attacks. No one can stand watch for ever, so he was allowed "below" for a cup of tea and a stretch of legs. While below, there was a flurry of aircraft fire and everyone rushed topsides. No one had been hurt, but he found his helmet, left on the Oerlikon seat, had a hole in it. A bullet was on the seat underneath it. Dad called it his day for the Lucky Draw.

The wills of the inhabitants of Cricklade and its surrounding areas are preserved in the records of the courts administering probate. They are invaluable for historians; they shed light on social background, family relationships and much more. All of them are available to the public, but they are preserved in the form and language of the time, and few have been transcribed into modern English.

We are fortunate in Wiltshire that all these wills can be accessed online, with high-resolution images of the documents freely available (and at no cost). Fortunately, it is fairly easy to become proficient at deciphering these documents and, with a little practice, to transcribe them into Modern English. I have been doing this for over twenty years and now work as a Latin transcriber for the Richard III Society's publishing arm, and am happy to provide the help and support to enable anyone to start reading these records with ease.

I would like to form a group of interested people to begin transcribing and publishing the Cricklade wills. We could start by meeting regularly to examine the material available, learn and practice transcription techniques. The Final Word ...

He told them another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. Though it is the smallest of all seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds come and perch in its branches.' Matthew 13:31-32:

Isn't it easy to overlook opportunities to help others because we don't think it would make a real difference. Little acts of kindness, chances to help another person, will pass us by if we're not paying attention. I keep reminding myself of this upside-down nature of God who has the most beautiful, powerful ability to take the little we have, offered to Him, and magnify it in a big way.

I also know when we feel unseen, unheard and unnoticed, it can feel incredibly hard to speak encouraging words to others. However, no matter what we may be facing, we have an opportunity not to overlook the small, mustard-seed opportunities where we can invest in others today.

When we feel invisible, help someone feel seen by reminding them how unique they are.

When we feel unheard, help someone feel heard by making space to listen to them, and prayerfully ask God how you can encourage them.

When we feel unnoticed, help someone feel significant by honouring the amazing little things they do to make the world a better place.

Why do all of this? We all want to live in a better world, so let's make a decision today to contribute to making it better. Let's vow to bring heaven to earth with the loving words we say and the moments we cultivate that bring laughter.

It doesn't have to be big to be significant. We can show up, listen and lean in. We can pray. We don't have to prove or earn anything. We can plan something joyful for another person that will simply be kind and honour God.

And sometimes God is inviting us to be a part of great things He is doing all around us, but we may miss the invitation because of its appearance of smallness or insignificance. We may never know what that next step is if we don't "listen for GOD's voice in everything [we] do, everywhere [we] go," as Proverbs 3:6 (MSG) instructs us. Each day we can look for His invitation to leave our plans behind to join Him in His wondrous work through small steps of obedience.

Let's start with the people right in front of us today. And watch how God turns something small into something big and beautiful in His timing.

I believe we have the opportunity to do something eternally significant every single day so let's not allow today to pass us by.
